Solemnity of All Saints

Matthew 5:1-12a

“He began to teach them, saying: . . .”

The Mount of the Beatitudes is at the northwest side of the Sea of Galilee. A small chapel surrounded by a wide balcony provides a panoramic view of the Sea and adjoining hill that slopes down to the water like the end zone of a football stadium. The prevailing winds carry sound up the hill without aid of electronic speakers. People gathered on the slopes to listen to a carpenter whose Life was a Reflection of his Words and a Testament that such Truth and Wisdom is from God. Patriarch Elias Chacour of the Melkite Catholic in the northwest of Israel and southwest of Syria speaks Aramaic, the language Jesus spoke. He says the Beatitudes were NOT Passive, but a Challenge by Jesus to the people who gathered, and to us, to “Get up and do something” to: Identify with the Poor; Mourn the Dead and Help their Survivors; Be Polite and Cooperative; Feed the Hungry; Be Merciful; Have a Pure Heart; Make Peace by Confronting Evil; and Endure Persecution for what Right. When we do all that we will truly be BLESSED.

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Last week I said that we as Catholics reject the idea that our works play no role in our salvation, but we also reject the idea of earning our salvation through our good works. This begs the question, what do we as Catholics believe about salvation?

So to make something abundantly clear, salvation is a free gift. We do not earn it. We do not deserve it. And there is nothing we can possibly do to be worthy of it. If we depend on ourselves for salvation we will most certainly rot in hell. Trying to earn our salvation would rather be like trying to pay off a billion dollar debt in our lifetime by paying a dollar a day. Actually it would be more like trying to pay off that billion dollar debt paying one dollar a day while we borrow two more dollars each day. It cannot be done. Since we cannot possibly earn salvation, it is a good thing that we don't need to. God offers salvation to everyone freely. The debt that is owed has been paid by Jesus on the Cross. When God sent his Son into the world it was so that we might find forgiveness for our sins. That we no longer needed to labor under the weight of the yoke that sin places on us. He offers us freedom from worry and the freedom to do what we ought.

If you were paying attention last week, it might sound like I am presenting the Protestant position on salvation, and in part I am. Both Catholics and Protestants believe that salvation is given to us as a free gift through our faith by Grace, but Protestants believe that our works play absolutely no role in our salvation. As Catholics we believe that they do play a role in our salvation. As the Apostle James says in his letter, "Faith without works is dead." So as Catholics we believe that we are saved by our faith but that if our faith is not accompanied by works it cannot save us. Faith alone is not enough. It is rather like someone hands you a priceless antique vase and tells you to care for it and you promptly throw it on the ground. The gift was given to you but you have the obligation to care for that gift and to accept that gift with care. It is through our works that we accept the gift and care for it. If we reject a gift or deliberately destroy it we no longer have that gift. In the same way, if we reject the gift of salvation by making no effort to change our lives or destroy that gift of salvation by refusing to follow the commandments and care for our neighbor. Then we will lose that gift that we have been given.

I often sum up Catholic theology of salvation in this way: There is nothing we can do to earn our salvation, but there is an awful lot that we can do to lose it.
