Love Your Enemies

Perhaps one of the most difficult mandates that Jesus directed of his followers is love of enemies. He was not talking about people whom we do not particularly like or who do not belong to your families, ethnic or political groups. He was very clear about this. Jesus was talking about those who actually hate us, cause us physical harm, or who take from us what we need to live. This kind of love is not only difficult but seems contrary to a specific kind of justice. This justice is called *retributive justice* and it maintains that evil deeds should be punished. This kind of justice is often accomplished by requiring time in jail or some form of fine.

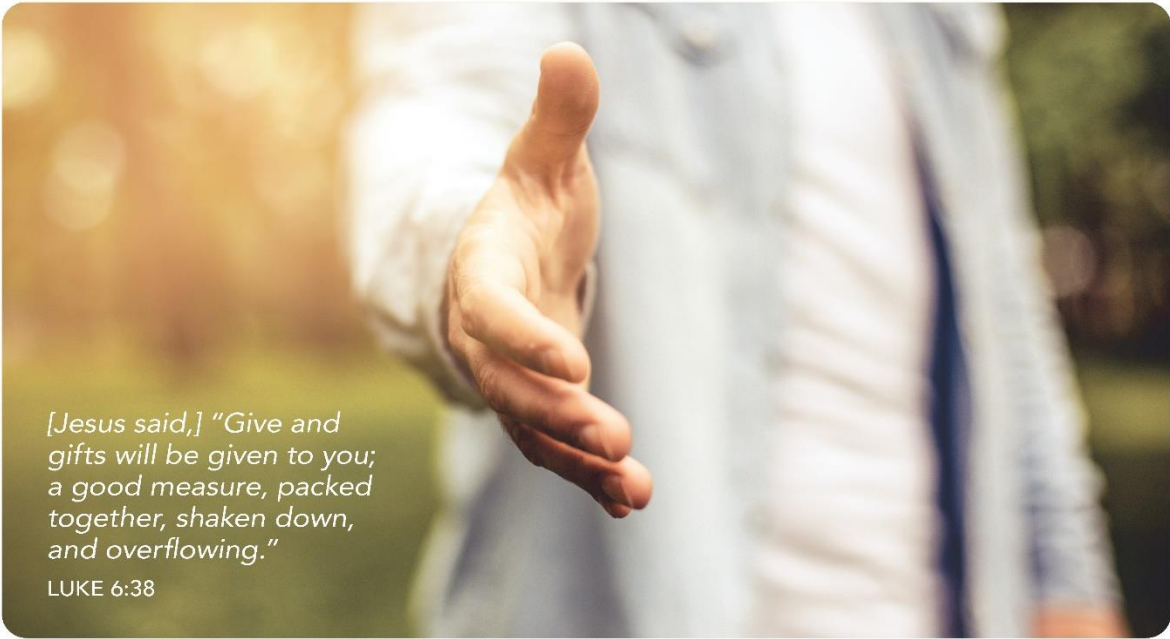
However, another kind of justice is called *restorative justice*. It maintains that a violation of someone's rights not only harms the victim, but it also fractures

society. Therefore, it is not enough for the perpetrator to be punished; society must be restored as well. This might require restoring the victim's sense of personal value or security. At times some form of community service is required. It has been said that the best way to get rid of enemies is to make them friends. That seems to be what Jesus is advocating in today's Gospel. If someone has hurt you, overwhelm that person with your kindness, just as God has overwhelmed you with kindness and mercy.

CVS Covid-19 at Home Tests

CVS Pharmacy will be launching a digital point-of-sale (POS) solution to enable individuals to quickly search for available OTC COVID tests. Individuals can enter their pharmacy benefit information, place an order and pick up from a nearby store. These claims will process as a point of service claim and therefore the \$14 cap will apply on these claims. Customers go to CVS.com or the CVS Pharmacy mobile application - click on "COVID-19 OTC tests", enter their zip code, and they will be directed to the closest CVS Pharmacy locations that have test inventory.

Saint of the day – St. Wulfric

(d. 1154) Born at Compton Martin, near Bristol, England, he became a priest and was excessively materialistic and worldly. After meeting with a beggar, he underwent a personal conversion and became a hermit at Haselbury, Somerset, England. For his remaining years, he devoted himself to rigorous austerities and was known for his miracles and prophecies. While he was never formally canonized, Wulfric was a very popular saint during the Middle Ages, and his tomb was visited by many pilgrims. Feast day: February 20.

Eucharistic Revival

The USCCB has announced that beginning on the Feast of Corpus Christi, June 19, 2022, the Catholic Church in the United States will embark on a three-year long Eucharistic Revival. This will be a "grassroots revival of devotion and belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. They [USCCB Bishops] believe that God wants to see a movement of Catholics across the United States, healed, converted, formed, and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist—and sent out in mission 'for the life of the world.'" Free N95 Masks

Free N95 masks provided by the Federal Government have begun being distributed to select CVS Pharmacy locations. Per the Federal Government, up to three masks will be available per person, while supplies last. Customers can request masks at the front of store checkout and signs will be posted to indicate N95 mask availability. At select pharmacies in Target and Schnucks, free N95 masks will be available at the pharmacy counter.

Dear Padre,

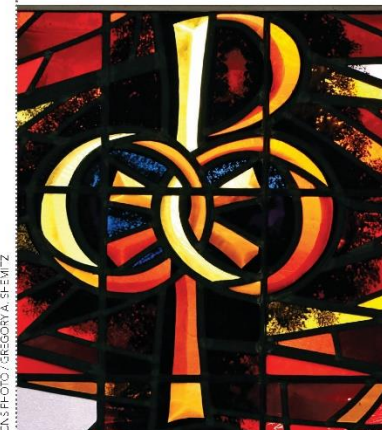
Previously you wrote that the Church is the bride of Christ, and we should remain faithful to that bond. Is there another reason to remain in the Catholic Church?

The Church is also the body of Christ. When Jesus ascended into heaven, he left his disciples with the mission he had received from the Father: instruct everyone in Jesus' teachings and baptize them into his divine life (Matthew 28:19–20). Through the Church, Jesus would remain present in the world.

Some take offense because the Church claims the authority of Jesus himself to teach. It teaches that marriage is between one man and one woman, that contraception and abortion are immoral, that capital punishment is a sin. Jesus himself may not have expressly addressed these issues, but he said to his apostles, "Whoever listens to you listens to me. Whoever rejects you rejects me" (Luke 10:16). And to Peter he said, "Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16:19).

It's true that since the time of the apostles some members, and even Church leaders, have caused scandal. The Lord asks that they, like Peter, repent and live a life of obedience and service to the Lord. That's why it's important that we examine our own actions. Someone who abandons the Church due to scandals within its ranks should realize that encouraging others to abandon the bride of Christ and the body of Christ is a scandalous act itself.
