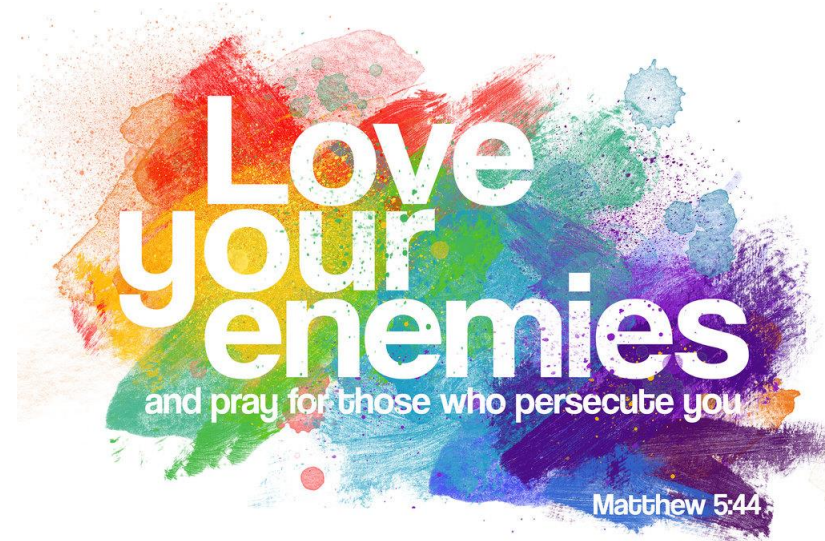

**Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)**

**February 23, 2020**

**Matthew 5:38-48**

What is the basis for wisdom of this world? In the Second Reading today, Paul poses this essential question. For him, the wisdom of the world is transitory and, at times, leads to a trap into which these purportedly "wise" people fall. God's wisdom, on the other hand, prevails, and it makes no sense to look for the wisdom of the world without first finding the wisdom of God. This message was addressed to the Corinthians, but it also speaks to us today, as we find ourselves in a culture where material goods are worth more than the intangible, spiritual gifts that God gives us to better walk in his ways. While the Gospel continues to unveil the teachings of Jesus to his disciples, the second reading reminds us that we are temples of the Holy Spirit. We belong to a Church that is called to be the new people of God, a pilgrim community committed to proclaim the reign of peace and justice, in which all of us are called to serve. If we wish to understand this message, Saint Paul invites us to open our hearts to the wisdom of God, not the wisdom of the world that almost always creates divisions among us. Both this letter and the Gospel text may serve our community groups, causing us to reflect on the values of Christian families, and how to face the challenges that our society presents us. How can we keep the balance between progress and tradition in our faith?

**PASTOR’S COLUMN**

In a few days we will begin the Lenten season with Ash Wednesday, and I want to remind everyone that our acts of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are the hallmark of our Lenten journey and it is through these act of prayer and penance that we grow closer to God during this season and become more authentic in our proclamation of the Gospel. This is the meaning of our sacrifices during Lent, not that we might suffer, but rather that we might grow closer to God.

This begs two questions: first, what are you doing for Lent this year, and second how is that helping you become closer to God? For most of us the answer to the first question is easy. It is what am I giving up for Lent this year? If you can't answer that question yet, you are a little behind the times, but it is not too late. Decide to make some sacrifice for Lent this year. It can be big, or it can be small. These sacrifices are a key part of our identity as Catholics. They are also a small though important part of how we grow in our relationship with God. So, choose some act of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving and allow this Lent to be part of your journey to the Father. Rather than giving up something inconsequential like a favorite food, give up gossip; give up gluttony, or give up anger and bitterness.

To decide how to accomplish this during Lent, we must take into account the second question. How does our Lenten sacrifice help us grow closer to God? This is a harder question for most of us because it is not something that we have ever really considered. We give something up for Lent because it's what our parents told us to do when we were children. I still clearly remember as a small child trying to figure out how I could give up something without actually giving anything up. I would give up a toy that I didn't really like or something similar, but as I grew older, I began to take it more seriously. However, it probably wasn't until I was at least in major seminary that I really considered how Lent should impact my relationship with God. It is a challenge for all of us to look at Lent in this way because it forces us to take an honest look in the mirror and ask the question, how am I failing? No one likes that question, but if each year during Lent we can change one thing in a substantial way, over the course of our lives we can make monumental changes. We can become the people we are called to be.
