PASTOR'S COLUMN

This week I am going to tackle the question of how we understand the divine revelation in scripture. Evangelical Protestants tend to view the scriptures as divinely written. This means, for lack of a better way of describing it, while Isaiah or Moses or David or whoever was writing the scripture held the pen it was actually God who did the writing. It is from this idea of scripture being divinely written that Evangelical Protestants get the idea that every word of the Bible is literally true. If God wrote the Bible how could it not be perfect in every way. This is not what we as Catholics believe about scripture. Historically speaking, this is a relatively new way to understand the Bible. The Jews and early Christians always understood that some of the scriptures were meant to be understood metaphorically and not literally.

As Catholics we believe that scripture was divinely inspired, not divinely written. This means that instead of God writing the scriptures through a person as an instrument, it was more like God was whispering in the author's ear. It was then up to that particular person to understand God's message and to convey it to the best of his ability. If he misunderstood the message that God was conveying or if he lacked the ability to accurately convey what God was telling him then a certain degree of misunderstanding could creep in. I want to be clear that we as Catholics still believe that the Bible is the Word of God and that it is inerrant, that is without error. However, as Catholics we believe that to truly understand the particular scripture we must understand its purpose. To put this another way as Catholics we believe that every word of the Bible is truth not necessarily that every word is true. The story of creation Genesis, for example, is not intended to be a textbook about how God created the Earth. Rather that passage is intended to tell us about the profound truth that God created everything out of nothing. It is meant to tell us that we are his greatest creation and that we alone among all that he created are made in his image and likeness. Whether or not he created the world in six days and rested on the seventh is completely unimportant to the truth of the story. For us as Catholics the literal truth of the story is unimportant. What is essential is the truths about God, ourselves, and the relationship between us and God that the Bible tells us.

Ministry of Care ~ Bring communion; visit homes, hospitals or nursing facilities by request

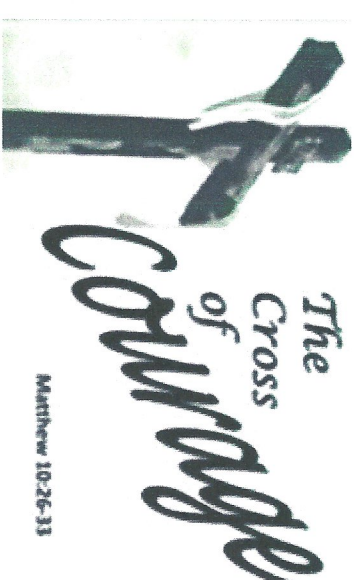

Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matt 10:26-33

And do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna.

“Only two things are certain, Death and Taxes” is often the response to people who ask, “Are you certain?” And that is very true. We can try to reduce or avoid taxes, but rarely with success. Death of our human body will eventually come to all of us. We can try to postpone the date, but we cannot prevent it. Jesus tried to assure his disciples, and through them he assures us, that we should not fear the death of our human body, but rather fear the death of our soul. We may have encountered people who do not believe in a God who loves them; who have lost all hope; who do not care about others; who commit evil without remorse. Without judging them, it is fair to wonder if their spirit is dead. We can feel sorrow for them; offer them help; try to show them by our deeds and words about God’s love for them, whatever their situation. But we can learn from them to pray that we continually grow in our faith and live our faith by what we say and do. Then someone may be able to kill our body, but no one can kill our soul.
