Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 14:22-33

“Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.”

Fear, disbelief, amazement and reassurance are just some of the emotions the disciples experienced when they saw Jesus walking toward their boat on the wind tossed waters of the Sea of Galilee. It is Peter who speaks to the person on the water. Notice he says, “If it is you . . .” Obviously, he is not sure. But at least he had the courage to ask. Then he says, “command me to come to you . . .” Peter hopes it is Jesus and he may even have believed it was Jesus. He wants to go to Jesus. But he does not want to take the responsibility for stepping out of the boat in the event he is wrong. He wants Jesus to “command” him so if he fails it is Jesus’ fault. Before we judge Peter and the other disciples too harshly we should reflect on our reaction when we sense Jesus is calling us, through his presence in the midst of turmoil and uncertainty, to step out of our comfort zone into a strange or risky situation. Do we have the faith, hope and courage to do so without being “commanded” by Jesus? Are we willing to be responsible for our faith?

The Seal of the Diocese of Owensboro



The clasped hands are taken from the great seal of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Emblazoned upon the cross are the stones and Palm Branch of Victory which represent Saint Stephen, Protomartyr, the patron of the Diocese and of the Diocesan Cathedral. This coat of arms was created for the Diocese by Pierre de Caignon la Rone.

The word Liturgy translates from Greek term which literally means a public work, or a work done on behalf of the people. The Church calls her worship a liturgy because it is meant to be done in the context of the community. Liturgy is done with the people of God and for the people of God. I like to refer back to St. Paul in his letters to the different communities of faith in the early Church. These small communities were made up of early Christians who most likely met in someone's house. They would recline at table, listen to the scripture, and break the bread. Throughout the entirety of the last 2000 plus years the Church has continued this beautiful tradition of coming together on a daily basis and offering worship to God. So, what's the point me of saying this? This year has been rough for us all. The world has been stricken by a deadly pandemic. We have lost everything we consider normal. We have lost freedoms and luxuries that I'm sure we all took for granted. Lives have been lost. Jobs have been lost. Little things such as visiting family and friends have been taken away. Everything was taken away it seems, including our community of faith. As a diocese we, for about ten weeks were not able to come together as a community to worship. During those ten weeks I was finishing up a pastoral year at St. Joseph in Bowling Green. I have come to grow in my relationship with Christ through my interactions with all of you. I have enjoyed getting many members of both parishes. I have enjoyed praying and ministering to all of you. St. Mary and Christ the King are two wonderful parishes rich in faith. I cannot thank you all enough for your welcome and support of me. I want to especially thank Fr. Daniel for his willingness to take me in this summer and supervise me. I know he asked you all to pray for both of us throughout the summer for both of us because I would be living with him. I think it all went well! I learned many things about being in a smaller parish this summer such as handling finances, doing odd jobs around the parish, etc. Again, I cannot thank the parishes of St. Mary and Christ the King enough for everything this summer. Thank you for being my community of faith. This next year I will be assigned to another parish in the diocese for another pastoral internship year.
