Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 16:21-27

“Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross and follow me.”

It is unlikely that Jesus could get elected to public office in the United States, or anywhere else. Denying ourselves and being concerned about the needs of others to the point of some inconvenience or risk are attitudes uncommon in our western culture of instant gratification and self-fulfillment. Peter, out of sincere concern for Jesus, tried to dissuade him from going to Jerusalem to fulfill his mission. Jesus calls him “Satan” and says he is thinking like men, not God. Jesus responds to Peter, not in anger, but in disappointment. Despite all Jesus had taught them, all they had seen, his disciples, including the “Rock,” did not understand that loving our neighbor as ourselves requires that we discern God’s will for us, whatever the inconvenience or risk, and use God’s great gift to us of free will to choose to do God’s will. Peter eventually discerns God’s will for him and does it. So must we.

PASTOR'S COLUMN

This week I want to continue to write on the teaching authority of the Church. Last week I wrote specifically about papal infallibility, but this week I want to take a step back and look more generically at how we understand the Church's teaching authority.

To understand the Church's teaching authority we must first understand the Church's understanding of Divine Revelation, or how God reveals himself to us. For Protestants there is only one source of Divine Revelation, the Bible. However, we as Catholics do not believe that there is only one source of Revelation. The image that the Church has always used for Divine Revelation is a three legged stool, and like a stool with three legs if you remove any one of those legs the stool falls down. The three legs of the stool are scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the Magisterium. If you lack any one of these you do not have the full picture of God's Revelation.

Scripture is the easiest to understand, and so I will begin there. I recently spent some time writing about scripture, and so I will only hit the high points here. Scripture is the Bible it is this most direct way that God reveals himself to us. It is is written word preserved throughout history passed down through the years so that we might know our history and God's commands. We believe that it is the unerring Word of God. Not only is it never wrong, on matters of faith and morals, but it cannot be wrong on those things. As I said in my columns on scripture, the Bible is not a science textbook nor is it a history textbook. That is not the purpose of scripture. The purpose of Scripture is for God to reveal himself to us. To our Protestant brothers and sisters this is where God's revelation ends, with the words of scripture. To us as Catholics this is not the end of God's revelation, rather it is only the beginning. After all there is nowhere where he tells them that they should attend to writing down his words. No, He commanded them to go out and preach. The writing of the Gospels was simply a way to preserve his teachings when it became clear that He was not going to return before the first generation of believers died. There is nowhere in the Gospels where Jesus commands his followers to write scripture. No, instead he commanded them to build a Church in His name, and he gave that Church the power to speak in that name. This is where the other two legs of the stool come into play Tradition and the Magisterium, and I will pick up with them next week.
